William "Bill" Ashley, M.D. 1921 - 2006

We remember fondly Dr. William Ashley, who passed on August 6, 2006, after a long battle with cancer. He was 85 years old.

Dr. Ashley was born in San Francisco. He attended Lawrenceville School in New Jersey and graduated from Princeton University and Johns Hopkins School of Medicine in Baltimore.

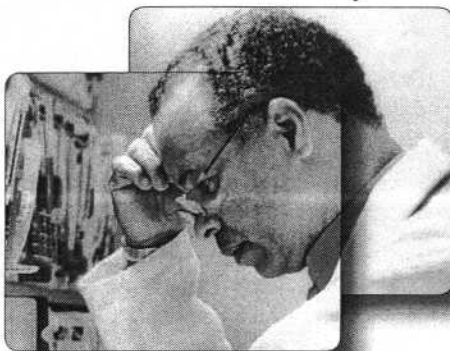
Dr. Ashley served aboard ship in the Navy for two years during WWII. Following the war, Dr. Ashley returned to San Francisco to establish his practice in Internal Medicine where he served on the staff of Southern Pacific Hospital and Children's Hospital.

In 1965, Dr. Ashley moved his medical practice to Eureka where he served on the staff of General Hospital and St. Joseph Hospital, where he became Chief of Staff.

Dr. Ashley was a member of numerous professional societies and of the Bohemian Club and Ingomar club. He loved family, his patients, the practice of medicine, carpentry, horseback riding and the mountains of California.
